DENVER SERGEANT INCLUDED IN LIST OF COLORADO WAR DEAD

Theodore Davidson Lost Life in Sicilian Campaign; Six Others From State Included in War Department's Latest Announcement.

First Sergt. Theodore Davidsen, 27, formerly of Brush, Colo., and Denver, was among seven Coloradans reported by the war department Saturday as killed in action overseas.

Sergeant Davidsen, who entered the army over three years ago as a member of the Brush detachment of the Colorado Na-

tional Guard, was killed in the conquest of Sicily last July 24, according to word received by his wife, the former June B. Millsap of 1075 Knox court. Besides his wife and infant

son, David, 2, he is survived by his mother, Mrs. Margaret Davidsen; a sister, Ruth Davidsen, both of the Knox court address: a brother, David Davidsen, baker first class, with the navy overseas, and another sister, Mrs. George Drake Theodore Davidsen. of Silver Cliff.



Other Colorado casualties, all in the north African area, which includes Sicily, with their next of kin include: Pvt. Carl F. Brinkman, son of Mrs. Mabel L. Brinkman of Grover; Sergt. John Levkulich, son of Mrs. George K. Levkulich of Craig; Pvt. Banner Manchego, son of Mrs. Juanita C. Manchego of Crestone; Pvt. Joseph B. Pais, son of Mrs. Lucy Pais of Morley, and Corp. John W. Stillion, son of Mrs. Winnie M. Stillion of Bayfield.

One Wyoming casualty, Rito Hernandez of Dines, also was included in the war department's list which announced the names of 608 men lost in the north African, European, North American, Pacific and southwest Pacific areas.

Pvt. Jose V. Garcia, son of Ysabel R. Garcia of Mountainair, N. M., was listed as killed in action in the

north African area.
