Received a letter from you bawling me out for not having answered your last letter. I'll have you know that I did answer your last letter. One from each of you.

But in case you did not receive it, I'll say that I feel the same as you do about Carrie. But what can we do now. Also that I regret to hear of Grandmother's passing away - God bless her!

I mailed a small package to you. By this time you should have received it. I had to mail it because we had an alert that looked like the real thing. Because of this alert I also

had to change my allotment  
from a class B to a class E  
allotment. Jo. will still receive  
<sup>23</sup> from me but she will not  
get any from the Gov. - Damn  
these alerts - ! I received Jessie's  
affidavit a day to late. A day  
before the affidavit arrived I  
had to have the allotment changed,  
because we were leaving - supposedly  
— so instead of being required  
to leave the allotment pending I  
had to change it.

I do feel rather bad to  
have made Jo. go to all the trouble  
of acquiring the affidavit. If  
Jo. is home let her read this.  
I'm also writing to her telling  
her about it but more than  
likely she is home now, so she  
wouldn't get my letter for a  
few days.

Our working day is increasingly getting harder and longer. We now have first call at 5:15 and have a mile run before breakfast. This doesn't give us much time to clean up our <sup>living</sup> quarters in the morning.

For the past couple weeks I've been fooling around at the theatre, but last night ~~I~~ I found out that they are kicking out all projectionists who are capable of combat duty, and replacing them with men who are not capable of combat duty — and will be

left behind as part of the station complement. So in the view of all this I see that it won't do me any good to hang around the theatre. Just when I was getting in.

How is everything at home? I suppose you are getting ready for the cold weather now.

What did you do Labor Day? As you probably have guessed, it was just another day to us.

Today we had a sixteen mile hike, - the first for a long time. Fortunately I don't feel as bad as some of the other boys. I'm still able to scratch out a few words.

We play touchball at every opportunity — usually about three or four times a week — so I'm really in good shape. After a game we aren't a bit sore. Not like the stiffness and soreness I used to experience at home after each game.
